EDITORIAL

Thank you to all your support. The atmosphere and enthusiasm within the club over the last few months has been wonderful. There has been huge interest in the things we have tried, and a lot of positive feedback from all.

After producing a Survey in January, it is time to initiate a few more changes. I have written an article, further in the newsletter, about the Survey, but do want to mention a number of things here, which have mostly resulted from the Survey.

Starting from 1st April, all our evening sessions (City and Rozelle) will change to a 7.15pm start, and aim for a 10pm finish with 24 boards a session. New movements may be arranged in evening sessions, as we settle into the new times. The new start time includes the Rozelle Wednesday night game. The lesson will start at the same time as before, but the game will start at 7:15pm.

Never play in the evening? We are offering half price to play in the Thursday night City sessions for all, for April. Not tried an evening session before? Here is a chance to come enjoy the friendly atmosphere. Don't forget, this is a 7:15pm start.

We are kicking off a once a month Sunday afternoon session. We will aim for the first Sunday of each month unless the premises are unavailable. Our first 3 months dates are April 7th, May 5th & June 9th, starting at 1:30. We have a sheet for "expressions of interest" to help us to prepare. If the sessions are popular, we will consider more. So, put your name on the sheet & the date in your calendar if interested. Walk-ins are welcome.

A trial version of our mentor programme will kick start in April. An experienced player has volunteered to stay behind after the Tuesday Morning sessions for 15 minutes for any bridge questions and discussion. This will be an opportunity to chat about the play or bidding of hands from the session in a group environment. It is also a chance to raise any other bridge-related concerns either among the group, or privately. So, struggle with a hand? Make a note & we will discuss it afterwards. No questions? Then he may do a presentation anyway. Please feel free to approach him. We hope more volunteers can join us for this mentor programme. This service starts Tuesday 2nd.

Some of our directors have also initiated a 15-minute talk before their session starts. Marcia Scudder always gives a presentation from 9.45- 10.00am on Tuesday mornings. Now Ian Lisle will also deliver a hand analysis from 9.30 -9.45am on his Wednesday morning sessions. No fixed topics. These presentations by the session director can be a hand you played the week before, or an easy fix for a common mistake. It can even be some useful tips in play or bidding or etiquette.

Afterwards, all participating Players will receive a book with commentary and analysis of the hands included. Once all results have been combined and published, RED masterpoints are given. To participate in this, would cost an extra \$5 per person. I need a show of interest. Do you want me to arrange this or not? Please give myself or the office some feedback.

We have also produced a "Handy Guide" for players joining the Open field or looking to play in a Congress. It is not a rule book, but an assist to the more common occurrences. It has a number of what we think are good tips for our Players. If you would like one, please come and see us.

For those who have played in Canberra and Gold Coast, we hope you enjoyed your journey. We would like to invite our members to take a photo in front of the "Congress sign", send them to us, we will be pleased to share your bridge journey with the others by creating a photo montage from our Players Bridge adventures.

Survey Results

I have had a number of people question me about how the survey went & what may come of it. Several changes are in the pipeline now, as a consequence of the survey responses, and hopefully more will occur over the rest of the year, time permitting.

The vast majority of people like the 10am starts in the morning, but people would prefer an earlier start and finish for evening sessions. We took a second survey on this on those who have attended the evening sessions only, and again there is a preference for an earlier start & finish. In the city, parking becomes free from 7pm in some areas, so it has been decided to start all SBC evening sessions at Rozelle & Goulburn St at 7:15pm and aim for a 10pm finish. This will be the new start time from April 1st.

There was also a lot of interest in having a weekend session. The most popular option was Sunday afternoon. We are going to trial a game once a month. Unfortunately, we cannot commit to a regular game slot, as there are other commitments & Congresses on some weekends. We will play the first Sunday of each month when available, the first 3 dates will be April 7, May 5 & June 9. We will play from 1:30pm — 4:45pm.

The vast majority do not want a break during sessions, so we will leave those as they are.

There is a huge interest in a short presentation before sessions. Tuesdays already has that presented by Marcia at 9:45. On Wednesdays, Ian will do a 15 minute presentation from 9:30 to 9:45. That will allow him time to setup the movement & tables for a 10am start of play. We hope some other sessions may follow suit shortly too. This could be made more possible if we had a few volunteers offer to help setup before play, and possibly greet and make welcome any new people or single players looking for a partner for the session. There was enough interest in a discussion after play, that on Tuesdays, after play, an experienced player will be making themselves available to lead a group discussion about bidding or play from the day, and also to be asked privately about related topics if needed... in a Mentor type role. We will try it, and see if there is any interest from the other Players.

We have begun some work on Bridge Etiquette and the like with some posters up, and signs in the acrylic stands. Please take the time to read them.

Name badges also received a lot of interest. That is something else that I hope to be able to instigate over the coming months, along with possibly a monthly "Over & Under" event. I'm thinking Fridays, maybe once a month if there is enough interest.

There is also a lot of discussion about how we may help people progress from Supervised to Open. Do we try a Rookie or Intermediate session? Do we striate results in competition categories based on masterpoints to create fairer "experienced competitive" fields? Do we give new players to the Open sessions some extra assistance? Are there other options?

This is just some of what has come from the surveys. I thank you all for your feedback. (

What annoys bridge players - Part 1

I am becoming a grumpy old man. There are things that really annoy me at the bridge table. However, I know I am not alone–I bet that everyone reading this will share at least one of my pet hates and some may share them all. I've listed them in order of most annoying first–your priorities may differ. Or you may agree that I'm just a grumpy old man.

Thanking opponents for doubling or pushing you to game when you make it: No matter how much you mean it in jest, your opponents will feel uncomfortable and may be annoyed at themselves if they've doubled a making contract or pushed you into a making game when you weren't going there yourself. Making a gratuitous comment at this point will add fuel to the fire. If this happens to you, consider yourself lucky but say nothing.


Making gratuitous comments after seeing you achieved a good result: It is the nature of bridge that a good result by one pair at the table equals a bad result for the other pair. So, when you get a top board and announce "top board, partner", it is equivalent to telling the opponents they got a bottom. Say nothing. If you like, just pass the Bridgemate to your partner or opponents if they seem interested.

Fiddling with the Bridgemate or scoring sheet before making the opening lead: After the auction period, the whole table is waiting for the player on opening lead to make that lead. If you have other duties, like entering the details to the Bridgemate or writing on your personal scorer, make your lead first. When you have two tasks to do and people are waiting for one of them, it's just good manners to do that one first. Same applies to dummy if they are on Bridgemate duty–spread dummy before fiddling with the Bridgemate.

Not claiming as declarer when the outcome is obvious: If you are nearing the end of play of a hand and it's quite clear that you have all the remaining tricks, it's bad manners (and in fact contrary to the laws) to continue to play. The opponents are often squirming, wondering what cards they should keep, and it can be a difficult decision. It's very annoying for them when they later find that anything they did made no difference. Of course, don't claim if you're in doubt, and when you do claim, state what you are going to do "e.g. drawing trumps and the table is high". Similarly if you're in dummy and can't get back to hand and there's a potential loser on the table, the opponents won't be silly enough to throw out the winning card when they can see what's on the table, so saying "I'll give you the last trick" saves everyone time.

Asking questions during the auction when you have no intention to bid: The laws allow players to ask questions about the bidding at their turn to call. But when you don't intend to bid regardless of what the meaning might be, then don't ask. It just slows the auction down. You will be entitled to a full explanation of the bidding at the completion of the auction so your rights are protected. In fact, asking questions needlessly can have a downside–firstly, the bidder's partner will hear the answer and will know whether they're on the same page, and secondly, expressing interest about particular bids, especially alerted ones, suggests to your partner that you have an interest in that suit and under the laws of Unauthorised Information, this may limit their options when they get on lead.



Saying "having none" when you trump an opponent's trick: This happens typically when you are trumping when the opponents aren't expecting it. The opponents won't be happy about this, and saying "having none" is simply unnecessary, and sometimes seems like tightening the thumbscrews. Of course, the partner of the player who is trumping can (and should) ask "No spades, partner?", as this serves a purpose.

Saying "thank you" gratuitously: It gets my shackles up when declarer has dropped a singleton king, or extracts a queen they successfully finessed, and says "thank you". Unnecessary, and irksome to the defenders.

Putting pen to the bidding pad without knowing what you want

to bid: Bidding often requires thought. While you're thinking, the other players will be looking at their cards and thinking about their next move. When you move your hand to the table, all players instinctively look across to the bidding pad waiting to see what you do, and tend to stay focussed till you make your bid. It can be annoying if you then retract your hand without doing anything, especially if you do it a number of times. It can also result in your left-hand opponent thinking you've passed and making their call, which would be an infraction if you didn't actually write anything.

Hmmm... that's quite a list. Maybe I am getting too grumpy. Anyhow, I'm sure everyone agrees with at least some of these. It all comes down to players being aware of how their actions affect others– a good policy at the bridge table, and in life generally.



Hand of the Week


By Joel Martineau (Masterpoint Press, Toronto, Canada, 2018, soft cover, 221 pages) \$25.95 post-paid or \$25 from Paul Lavings NSWBA Book Stall at Goulburn Street

The enthusiastic author presents 52 hands where he was involved, to instruct and entertain the reader. His analysis leaves no stone unturned and he explains the reasoning behind every bid and play. He does not say so but Martineau could well be a professional player assigned to improve his partners' game. Then again he is not adverse to occasionally playing with pros as well.


Most of the hands are from Matchpoint play, the game played 4 mornings a week at NSWBA. I enjoyed this deal because defence is the soul of the game and also most defenders err here at trick one by taking their ace. The bidding proceeds:

From \spadesuit 10854, \clubsuit 1092, \blacklozenge J10752, \clubsuit K our hero leads D5 and when dummy goes down his partner sees:



When declarer plays low from dummy East smoothly plays the 8. The secret is the Rule of 11, deduct the lead card, the five, from 11 and that gives the number of cards above the 5 in the other three hands. Dummy has two, you have three so declarer has only one card above the 5.



Declarer needs to set up clubs to come to 9 tricks so continues with \clubsuit Q. West wins \clubsuit K and continues with \blacklozenge J. Declarer has a nasty guess, to duck playing East for \blacklozenge A or put up the \blacklozenge K playing West for the ace. Eventually declarer goes up with \blacklozenge K and goes down two.

A fascinating book but quite intense, one hand at a time is recommended.
